AUGUST IN OUR HISTORY

August 2001	Two G.S.O. New York staff members and Dr. George Vaillant (nonalcoholic trustee) travel to China to meet with medical practitioners and attend meetings of China's three A.A. groups in existence at the time — two in Beijing and one in Changchun. By invitation, Dr. Vaillant addresses a gathering of some 50 physicians on the subject of alcoholism.
August 1981	The millionth copy of the Big Book is printed.
August 11, 1938	Frank Amos and others who had attended the December meeting offer to confer with Bill, Leonard Strong, and various members of the New York group to consider how the movement can be given an organizational framework. As a result, the Alcoholic Foundation is formally established, with Dr. Bob as a trustee and Bill on the advisory committee.
August 16, 1935	Sister Ignatia Gavin, a frail but no-nonsense Catholic sister in charge of admissions at St. Thomas Hospital in Akron, Ohio, with the help of Dr. Bob Smith, one of the founders of Alcoholics Anonymous, admitted the first alcoholic patient under the diagnosis of acute gastritis, thus making St. Thomas Hospital the first hospital in the world to treat alcoholism as a medical condition
August 8, 1879	Dr. Bob born in St. Johnsbury, VT.

MEET THE MEETING: BALLARD GROUP

When A.A. was firmly established in Seattle, it was inevitable that the movement would reach into that stronghold of Scandinavian fishermen and sawmill workers – Ballard. Several starts were made at getting a Group established in Ballard, but it was not until 1948 that success attended these efforts. The cofounders of the Group were: Tom B., Morris M., Ernie and Joe O., who all had their A.A. indoctrination at Group One. From this start of four members, it is not uncommon to find 40 or more present at the regular Monday night meeting of the Group. In recounting the experiences of the Ballard Group, Joe O. points out, "In early times, a visitor was a rarity. Now the visitors often outnumber the members. In the old days, one meeting per week was considered sufficient. Now, many take in several meetings a week going from Group to Group. This seems to make for a more objective outlook, but also seems to lessen individual responsibility."

Other early members included "Pete" P., Dave S., Ben and Ken K., Roger S., Paul S., Harvey C., and as time went on – Luther J., Dave M., Frank D., and El S., became a part of the picture. The first woman to break the ranks of the all-male Ballard Group was Ann L., who was the lone woman member for several months, Ann has done her full share of 12-Step work and as time has gone on the Group female contingent includes Harriet J., Bernice J., Ardelle J., Betty F., Irene D., Lynnette J., and Ruth F.



Month Only - Jun 2018:

- 1) Group Contributions for the month was of \$10k about <u>\$300 higher than budget and \$2k</u> more than prior month
 - a) This is great news and May group contributions just seems to be timing issue not trend
- 2) Total Expenses for the month were about \$15k actual about **<u>\$1k less budget</u>**
 - a) Primarily due to lower staff costs
- The net loss of about \$2k for the month is almost all due inventory non-recurring adjustments (\$1k from mid-year physical inventory adjustments and \$1k for old schedules given to committees)

YTD - Jun 2018:

- 1) Group Contribution income was \$65k about <u>\$3k more than budgeted</u>
- 2) Individual Contributions Room Rent and Birthday Club income was \$10k about <u>\$7.5k</u> more than budgeted
- 3) Total Expenses were about \$95k actual and about \$2k less budgeted

If GSIG continues to receive the generous support both in terms of money and time from the Groups and individuals throughout the rest of the year, I expect for the for first time in about 5 years your Seattle Intergroup will be close to break-even or a small net profit.

Cash and Prudent Reserve:

GSIG is now back above our prudent reserve with total Cash and CDs of about \$80k.

We purchased new CDs in July 2018, i.e. now about \$50k in CDs

Office Committee (Aaron C., Chair): The Office Committee convened and went through our agenda items; Office Managers report, Assistant Office managers report, and Treasurers report. We reviewed the 6mo physical inventory of sailable items that the office manager performed. It was a short meeting. Thank you all for your service. *Written report submitted* 7/17/18.

Office Manager (Norm S.):

I am pleased and grateful to submit this Office Manager Report for June 2018.

Inventory—Inventory levels are considered adequate. July 2018 schedule books were received on Monday, July 2. We ordered 15,000 copies, a 16% reduction, which resulted in a higher unit cost, but lower overall cash outflow. I conducted a physical inventory on July 2. There were a significant number of surplus January 2018 schedules which have been expensed to our committees at cost. The result of the physical inventory itself was a loss of (\$1,088), disappointing but still less than 3%, a normal deviation for us. I again suspect failure to transact errors rather than theft.

Process/Organization-

Office/phone weekday coverage: We have openings Wednesday afternoons from 2-6 p.m., Thursday mornings from 10-2 p.m. and I was recently advised that Jon C. is giving up his Friday morning slot. Jon wants to continue his volunteer janitorial duties but shift to Tuesday mornings so he can attend Sober Over Sixty. We are extremely grateful to Jon for his many years of service as a phone volunteer.

Weekday evening and weekend shifts: There are now several openings for group phone answering evenings and weekends—3rd Sundays, 2 p.m. to 6 p.m. and 6 p.m. to 10 p.m., 3rd Wednesdays, 6 p.m. to 10 p.m., 1st and2nd Thursdays, 6 p.m.-10 p.m., 4th Fridays, 6-10 p.m. and 1st and 5th Saturdays, 6-10 p.m. Please communicate these group service opportunities to your groups!

Nightwatch shifts: When the July Nightwatch calendar was published, all positions were filled. Our chair, Len T., is taking 3 positions, which I am sure he would be willing to give up for new volunteers. Please let your GSR's know that they should e-mail nightwatch@seattleaa.org to express interest and for an updated list of openings.

Physical Plant: Having learned our lesson about preventative maintenance on the HVAC system, this was performed by Northwest Aire Services for the quarter. Cost was \$150 plus filter cost. Our carpeting and tile are once again looking a little ratty. Probably we will address this in late July or August.

Financial Statements—The financial result for June was a net loss of (\$2,100) versus a budgeted loss of (\$470). Group contributions of \$10,500 exceeded budget of \$10,300. Retail sales lagged budget by (\$3,000) but were offset by lower cost of sales. Gross profit was under budget due to lower retail sales and the physical inventory adjustment. Fixed costs were \$15,400 versus the budgeted \$16,200. This underspending resulted mainly from salaries and wages where hours worked were lower, offset by committees taking the surplus schedules. Year to date net income for the six months was a positive \$4,800, still exceeding the budgeted \$20 by a substantial amount. New accounts payable checks drawn on U.S. Bank have been received, so it is anticipated that the bank change will be completed in July.

It was **moved** (zone 131) and **seconded** (zone 132) to adjourn the meeting. **Motion adopted unanimously.** The meeting was closed with the Responsibility Statement at 8:22pm.


