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## STEP 12

**CONFORMING TO STEP 12** seemed beyond me when I limped into AA broken and downhearted Jan. 7, 2019.

Given my prejudice against the word God, and all things religious/spiritual, I did not believe I'd have the qualifying spiritual experience required to enthusiastically carry the message to other alcoholics.

I thought being sober would be enough for me, the rest of y'all are on your own.

But luckily for me, the deeper I dive into Step work, sponsorship and service work, meetings and additional sober time (earned one day at a time), the easier it is for me to recognize I really NEED Step 12.

I used to cringe when I heard people say at meetings I'd have to give away what was freely given to me in order to remain happy, joyous

and free. But that's exactly what I believe now.

I was born completely selfish. A story from my relative youth (age 21) illustrates how selfcentered I was (am). I was a counselor in a camping program where middle-school boys spent six weeks camping and working at six different sites in western Washington.

We camped in the Olympics and Cascades.

We carried in our own food, drank from streams and wells, and slept on the ground. My pride and joy was a walking stick I created from a Madrona tree limb.

When we returned to Seattle and were saying our goodbyes, one of the campers, my favorite kid, asked me for that stick.

Having had
a spiritual
experience as a
result of these
steps, we tried
to carry this
message to
alcoholics, and
to practice these
principles in all
our affairs.

I was gentle about it, but I refused his request because I really loved that stick and wanted the souvenir of a great summer. I simply could not bear to give it to someone, even someone I loved. It was too valuable to me or so I thought.

But less than an hour after I returned home, in a hurry to meet friends for a happy happy at a nearby Capitol Hill tavern, I carelessly stored the stick in the corner of my room, then threw my heavy backpack into the same corner.

The stick shattered to bits when my pack hit it.

I was gutted when I realized that the my beloved stick would have been better off if I had given it away instead keeping it for myself. I literally needed to give it away instead of clutching it.

I often think of that moment when I want to bow out of working with others. I have to give away my beloved sobriety away if I want to keep it.

**THIS TRADITION** rather baffled me when I was starting out. I could not help being positively impressed and influenced by some of the people I met in the rooms. I needed their support and examples to keep coming back.

In someways I was relying on them before I could figure out how I could make the power of our program mine.

On my third day "back" in January 2019, I went to a small meeting in south Seattle. There were no more than nine people present, but two stood out above the others.

One was an African American man in his sixties, the other was a woman with beautifully coiffed hair who had once been

60. They had different deliveries and used different vocabularies, but they were spellbinding speakers.

In fact, my first reaction was one of suspicion. They were so passionate, relatable and articulate, I thought they were planted. They were sent to the meeting by some AA trickery to lure in newcomers like me.

It worked! I'm still here and in frequent contact with both of them. They "real" AAs, just like you and me, with more than 30 and 40 years sober, respectively. They willingly share their experience, strength and hope with anyone who'll listen.

They have sponsored hundreds of folks.

In AA one individual can rise above the group. We are all equals, not matter how admirable and attractive one person can be.

Early on in recovery, my sponsor had me read A NEW PAIR OF GLASSES by Chuck C., an

> influential AA member is Souther California. That book helped propel my interest in and devotion to working the Steps.

I had a visit to Los Angeles shortly after read the book. When I looked up meetings in L.A., I found one named A New Pair o Glasses. I noticed that it was located less than a mile from Chuck C.'s office in south central Los Angeles.

I had to go. There 20 people or so in attendance. It was

a rousing meeting. Lots of people sharing. At no time did they mention Chuck C.'s name. There was no plaque with his likeness. When I asked the secretary after the meeting, he said he's never heard of Chuck or the book.

I was disappointed and surprised. But after I thought about it for several days, I realized that's how it should be. The principles of our program are more important and necessary than individual AA personalities.

The Traditions ensure the survival of Alcoholics Anonymous with the help of all of us.



Motion: GSIG Accessibility Committee to support the General Service Conference Proposed Agenda Item Motion for 2024 conference.

#### **GSC Proposed Agenda Item Motion:**

Propose that AAWS/GSO make a plan to begin translating critical AA literature into American Sign Language. The literature priority list has been identified from a survey of deaf AA members on Nov 2, 2022. The priority list includes:

- Big Book personal stories in the upcoming 5th edition.
- P-16 The A.A. Group...Where It All Begins
- P-19 G.S.R. General Service Representative
- AA Service Manual

Intent/Purpose: In keeping with our Primary Purpose; provide access to critical pieces of AA literature in American Sign Language (ASL) for Deaf alcoholics and ASL Deaf groups."

Current Practice: Currently the only chapters describing the A.A. recovery program, the original Twelve Steps and the personal histories of A.A. 's cofounders from the 4th Edition of the Big Book have been translated into American Sign Language. The personal stories have NOT been translated.

No group service literature available for Deaf AA members/groups in American Sign Language.

Very few Deaf alcoholics have ever had access to tradition based AA groups business meetings, District and Area business meetings to learn by experience.

A common misconception about American Sign Language is that it is a simple translation of English. Native Deaf ASL users find it difficult to process written text because it's technically a whole different language to American Sign Language. Signed languages have a different grammatical and sentence order making them very different from spoken and written languages and can prove difficult for sign language users to translate effectively. Consequently, an ASL user has many of the same challenges with reading and writing in English as others for whom English is a second language.

People who were born deaf to hearing parents often suffered from language deprivation during the critical period of language acquisition, approximately the first five years of a child's life. For these individuals it's even more challenging to successfully learn to read and write English.

**Budgetary Impact:** No budgetary impact to GSIG Accessibility Committee. Cost saving suggestions have been included in the GSC proposed agenda item submission form.




