November In Our History

"Never could we recapture the great moments of the past." (Alcoholics Anonymous, page 151). But here we list some.

Nov 1934	Ebby T. carries message to Bill.
Nov 1936	Fitz M leaves Towns Hospital to become 'AA #3 in NY', with Bill W and Hank P.
Nov 1937	Bill and Dr. Bob compare notes in Akron. Count forty cases staying sober. Meeting of the Akron Group to consider Bill's ideas for how to expand the movement a book, AA hospitals, paid missionaries. Passed by a majority of 2.
Nov/Dec 1939	Akron group withdrawals from association with Oxford Group. Meetings moved from T Henry & Clarence Williams to Dr Bob and other members? homes.
Nov 1941	"First Mass AA Meeting" in Oklahoma City, 8 present, 1 was drunk.
Nov 1945	Bill's article called 'Those Goof Balls' published in Grapevine.
Nov 1986	Big Book published in paperback.
Nov 1, 1947	1st AA Group in Anchorage, Alaska.
Nov 1, 1963	Reverend Sam Shoemaker dies.
Nov 3, 2001	J P Miller who wrote screenplay for "The Days of Wine and Roses" died.
Nov 9, 1966	President Johnson appoints Marty M to the 1st National Advisory Committee on Alcoholism.
Nov 10, 1940	1st AA group formed in Minneapolis.
Nov 10, 2001	1st of 400,000 4th Edition Big Books arrives in the mail.
Nov 11, 1934	Armistice Day; Bill started drinking after dry spell, beginning of Bill's last drunk.
Nov 12, 1940	1st AA meeting is held in Boston.
Nov 13, 1939	Bill wants to go to work at Towns Hospital, NY drunks want him to stay on as head of the movement.
Nov 14, 1940	Alcoholic Foundation publishes 1st AA Bulletin.
Nov 15, 1949	Bill W suggests that groups devote Thanksgiving week to dicussions of the 12 Traditions.
Nov 16, 1950	Dr. Bob died.
Nov 18, 1946	1st Dublin Ireland group met.
Nov 21, 1939	AA's in San Francisco hold 1st California AA meeting in the Clift Hotel.
Nov 21, 1952	Willard Richardson, past Treasurer/Chairman of Alcoholic Foundation, dies.
Nov 26, 1895	Bill W born in East Dorsett, VT.
Nov 26, 1939	Dilworth Lupton gave sermon "Mr. X and Alcoholics Anonymous". Became one of first pamphlets on AA.
Nov 28, 1939	Hank P writes Bill advocating autonomy for all AA groups.
Nov 28, 1943	Bill guest speaker San Quentin Penitentiary (sometimes dated Dec 2, 1943).

- 2. Every natural instinct cries out against the idea of personal powerlessness.

Tradition Eleven

From "The Language of the Heart" by Bill W.

PROVIDENCE has been looking after the public relations of Alcoholics Anonymous. It can scarcely have been otherwise. Though we are more than a dozen years old, hardly a syllable of criticism or ridicule has ever been spoken of A.A. Somehow we have been spared all the pains of medical or religious controversy and we have good friends both wet and dry, right and left. Like most societies, we are sometimes scandalous – but never yet in public. From all over the world, naught comes but keen sympathy and downright admiration. Our friends of the press and radio have outdone themselves. Anyone can see that we are in a fair way to be spoiled. Our reputation is already so much better than our actual character!

Surely these phenomenal blessings must have a deep purpose. Who doubts that this purpose wishes to let every alcoholic in the world know that AA is truly for him, can he only want his liberation enough. Hence, our messages through public channels have never been seriously discolored, nor has the searing breath of prejudice ever issued from anywhere.

Good public relations are AA lifelines reaching out to the alcoholic who still does not know us. For years to come, our growth is sure to depend upon the strength and number of these lifelines. One serious public relations calamity could always turn thousands away from us to perish – a matter of life and death indeed!

The future poses no greater problem or challenge to AA than how best to preserve a friendly and vital relation to all the world about us. Success will rest heavily upon right principles, a wise vigilance, and the deepest personal responsibility on the part of every one of us. Nothing less will do. Else our brother may again turn his face to the wall because we did not care enough.

So the Eleventh Tradition stands sentinel over the lifelines, announcing that there is no need for self-praise, that it is better to let our friends recommend us, and that our whole public relations policy, contrary to usual customs, should be based upon the principle of attraction rather than promotion. Shot-in-the-arm methods are not for us – no press agents, no promotional devices, no big names. The hazards are too great. Immediate results will always be illusive because easy shortcuts to notoriety can generate permanent and smothering liabilities.

More and more, therefore, are we emphasizing the principle of personal anonymity as it applies to our public relations. We ask of each other the highest degree of personal responsibility in this respect. As a movement we have been, before now, tempted to exploit the names of our well-known public characters. We have rationalized that other societies,

ONE OF THE BIGGEST BENEFITS I get from the Step 10 phone app I use nightly is the reminder it gives me to make time for Step 11's call for prayer and meditation daily.

The worst thing I can do according to how my My 10 Step app grades my responses, is failing to "connect with my Higher Power through prayer and meditation today."

Having a resentment, "not reaching out to others"

or failing to "be kind and loving toward all" do not dent my scores nearly as much as not praying or meditating, which makes sense in my experience.

When I fail to start my day with prayer, it seems to quickly fall into the dumpster, until I do what so many AA folks suggest: restart my day with a prayer. (Why I am always surprised when it works?)

On the other hand, I have to be very intentional with meditation. I'm unlikely to "find" time for it. I have to "make" time for meditation. I would love to set aside 30 minutes for it each day, but my schedule simply won't allow that most days.

However, my sense of serenity is boosted every time I meditate, even if it is just for a few minutes. \triangle

even the best, do the same. As individuals, we have sometimes believed that the public use of our names could demonstrate our personal courage in the face of stigma, so lending power and conviction to news stories and magazine articles.

But these are not the allures they once were. Vividly, we are becoming aware that no member ought to describe himself in full view of the general public as an AA, even for the most worthy purpose, lest a perilous precedent be set which would tempt others to do likewise for purposes not so worthy.

We see that on breaking anonymity by press, radio,

or picture, any one of us could easily transfer the valuable name of Alcoholics Anonymous over onto any enterprise or into the midst of any controversy.

So it is becoming our code that there are things that no AA ever does, lest he divert AA from its sole purpose and injure our public relations. And thereby the chances of those sick ones yet to come.

To the million alcoholics who have not yet heard our AA story, we should ever say, "Greetings and welcome. Be assured that we shall never weaken the lifelines which we float out to you. In our public relations, we shall, God willing, keep the faith." \triangle

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Gift of Gratitude

GRATITUDE ITSELF IS A GIFT. For a long time, I felt like gratitude was something I was supposed to have. I got sober and was rescued from an early death, so I should be grateful. Don't have any negative feelings, but instead make a gratitude list. I felt like I had to work at being grateful. What I've realized is that gratitude isn't something I should be doing or feeling; gratitude is a gift I receive in sobriety.

The program of recovery has taught me about living in the present moment and living life on life's terms. It has taught me about acceptance and being of service. I have learned to be honest, even if that means being rejected, and to be giving, even if that means not getting what I want. I have learned to take my own inventory and amend the harms when I make mistakes. I have learned how to recognize my defects and practice the opposite. I have learned how alcoholism blocks me from my Higher Power and what actions to take to remove those blocks and keep the connection open. The result has been a personality change sufficient to bring about recovery from alcoholism. All this recovery work has resulted in a psychic change.

My personality changed from self-centered, self-seeking, resentful and full of fear and dishonesty to being able to focus on all the gifts in my life. The spiritual awakening that I received as a result of doing these steps takes the shape of gratitude. The program of recovery gave me gratitude and gratitude is one of the most powerful treatments for relief from the bondage of self, self-centered fear and all the ways my alcoholic thinking can cause pain in my mind. In any moment and in any situation, a little gratitude can let in The Light. Rather than something I should do, it has become a way of living.

Gratitude walks with me every day. And for that, I am very grateful. \triangle

Gratitude Story

I HAD BEEN SOBER in AA from age 25 until 43 in Baltimore, MD. I have recently returned to the program after being out seven-and-a-half-years.

I now have 22 months.

When I think about my gratitude to AA for my sobriety, I think about my former brother-in-law, who has 23 years. He lived five blocks from my house during the time of my relapse. He used to pop over to my house every Tuesday on his way to his home group meeting to check on me and see how my drinking was going. (Lol!)

This man would encounter something or someone different every week as my drinking progressed. It ranged from a bunch of drunk, naked women in the pool to me showing my drunk friends how to give me an IV. I'm a nurse and was I preparing them in case I had such a bad hangover they could give me an IV to relieve those hangovers.

He was considered a "Big Book Kevin." He drove me crazy. God love him for continuing to check on me. He never judged me and my actions out loud. However, there were a couple times he left quickly.

When my partner, whom I met in the thick of my disease, and I decided to take a break from alcohol on New Years Eve 2021, I had no desire to ever attend AA again. I was grateful for the nearly 19 years growing up in AA, but did not think I was that bad of an alcoholic and wanted to be able to indulge in an adult beverage if I chose to. The reality was at the end of 2021, my liver was warning me and I thought a little break from alcohol and the pot that I smoked daily, would be good for my health.

When Jan. 1, 2022 arrived, I began a quest to live a sober life without going to AA. Then God interviewed.

That former brother-in-law was a snow bird in Arizona in the winter months. He was injured in a motorcycle crash around my 13th day of not drinking.

He was in ICU, severely hurt. His sober friends had reached out to see if I had heard from him, as he almost always was in contact with these men from AA and they had not heard from him and were worried. I began calling around and reached his step-daughter, who was my niece. She lived with him. She told me about the accident and that she was flying to Arizona to be there for him.

Being a nurse, I wanted to help. I volunteered to go to Arizona. I called my employer and let them know I was taking a leave of absence to care for Kevin. I wasn't thinking about anything other than being available to help him.

I am grateful for this nudge from the God of my understanding.

He spent 30 days in the hospital recovering from his many injuries and attendant surgeries. Then he was released to his home.

He was on oxygen, could not drive nor could he care for himself. I had been in Arizona almost a month at this time, without my family. My partner, Fred, and his daughter flew out to Arizona to spend a weekend.

Right out of the hospital, Kevin wanted to go to an AA meeting. I asked Fred to take him because I didn't want to go to a meeting. The shame, remorse and regret that I felt from my relapse was overwhelming and the thought of going to a meeting was frightening.

Fred took Kevin to a meeting that morning, thank goodness. After Fred went home from Arizona,

Kevin wanted to attend his daily AA meeting and asked me to drive him. He said I could sit in the car or come in to the meeting with him.

Guess what I did? I found myself in a meeting of Alcoholics Anonymous, relating to those that shared and felt the ease and comfort I used to feel from that first drink

That's where my my journey in sobriety began again. Kevin and I went daily to that 7 a.m. meeting in Phoenix, and after the meeting we went to breakfast for fellowship.

Attending meetings away from home was a Godsend. I was able to sit and be reminded of this is progressive, fatal disease. That was crystal clear to me. I was welcomed with love and acceptance. I felt no judgement for my relapse.

I came back home to Burien and eventually found my way to *Sober Sisters of Seattle*.

I found my sponsor and a tribe of women to share this journey with.

I am currently the GSR for our home group, I secretary the *Pass it On* meeting, I sponsor women, I have a phone commitment with Night Watch, I am active within the fellowship of Alcoholics Anonymous and, most importantly, have a relationship with a God of my understanding, which changes daily, as I change and evolve.

I am so grateful for the Twelve Steps, which have led me to God, the 12 Traditions, which have kept the doors of Alcoholics Anonymous open for the suffering alcoholic and my sponsor, for her endless selflessness.

As a member of AA, and having had long term sobriety and relapsing, I am here to say it was extremely hard to walk back in the rooms of AA.

I am grateful the only requirement for membership is a desire to stop drinking (Tradition Three) and that each group has one primary purpose (Tradition Five), to carry its message to the alcoholic that still suffers. \triangle




The Gift of Gratitude

I was reintroduced to a Higher Power with whom I now have an intimately personal relationship. I feel gratitude whenever I feel His presence in my life. You have helped me to grow emotionally and understand my feelings and cope with them in healthy, nondestructive ways. It is because of you, the members and the program of Alcoholics Anonymous that I am grateful to live happy, joyous and free. \triangle

Then he said, "Then you'll do 90 in 90."

I did those 90 in 90 and it turned out to be the best advice that I could have received. I am fortunate to say that relapse has not been a part of my story to date. On Nov. 11, 2023, I will celebrate 30 years, and I just turned 60 years old, which means I have spent half my life in the program and sobriety. For that I am grateful. \triangle

23.1 We move that Western Washington Area 72 support Oregon Area 58's proposed agenda item to prioritize the following pieces of AA literature into ASL: the personal stories in the upcoming fifth edition; the pamphlet the AA group; the GSR pamphlet; and the AA Service Manual. PASSED

23.2 In the spirit of unity, we affirm that District 25 is an online district with no geographic boundaries. PASSED

- This topic garnered the most discussion, and it passed with substantial unanimity.
- 23.3 Area 72 submit the following Proposed Agenda Item for consideration at the General Service Conference: "The General Service Board develop supplemental reporting focused on the actual costs of the various service items we provide, with an initial draft being brought back to the Conference Committee on Finance for review at the General Service Conference." PASSED
- This passed after discussion about how the GSB has handled our funds and bills. The Area felt like there could be more detailed transparency in how the board uses our funds.

DISCUSSION TOPIC:

Web standing committee charter and responsibilities.

• The nature of the web standing committee has changed and is no longer solely concerned with local websites. Many discussions center around technology questions concerning online/hybrid meetings, electronic baskets, etc. and the equipment involved. They are asking the Area for input/permission to change the scope of their original charter and responsibilities to include the changing technology environment. The Area was behind them all the way and looks forward to a new "Web and Technology Standing Committee".






